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

Red, White, & Blue To-Do FACT SHEET Philadelphia Historic District, July 2, 2024

Philadelphia Historic District partners present the first-ever Red, White, & Blue To-Do celebration on July 2, 2024, commemorating a day of "pomp and parade," as declared by John Adams in 1776, encouraging visitors to celebrate independence in the place where it all began.

A vibrant display of patriotic celebration, Red, White, & Blue To-Do brings together museums, historic sites, and local businesses in America's most historic square mile to honor our nation's founding. This monumental occasion promises to be a memorable experience for all, featuring the Red, White, & Blue To-Do Pomp & Parade, festooned decor, concerts, games, extended visitation hours at area historic attractions, restaurant specials, and much more.



9 - 11 am: The fun begins with flag raisings, museums and



Red, White, & Blue To-Do Pomp & Parade Elements Red Radio Flyer Wagon Floats

- Birthday Cake Float This handmade float features an oversized laver cake covered in millions of silver and blue flakes of chunky glitter. The eight-foottall creation is decorated with stars, circles, and over five hundred strips of red-and-white and blue-and-white star half bows. This is the only float that has been pre-made, and was conceived and constructed by parade producer Todd Marcocci of Under The Sun Productions Inc. It took him nearly 48 hours to fully create the final finished product.
- American Flag Float Volunteers in Philadelphia will simulate the same techniques and processes that volunteers execute at the Tournament of Roses parade in



Pasadena, California. For the American flag float, volunteers will hand-glue close to 200 white faux carnation heads, 200 red faux carnation heads, and around 100 blue faux carnation heads. The fifty stars on the flag will be made of individual leaves from faux white cherry blossom branches. This creation will be mounted onto wooden wagons that will be used as the base of the float, and then pulled along the parade route by an adult volunteer.

- <u>Liberty Bell Float</u> What will five pounds of onion seeds, ten pounds of flax seed, and six hundred Hemlock pine cones create on this float? The Liberty Bell! The silhouette of the Liberty Bell will be created using white glue and placing thousands of flax seeds on the body of the bell, and then volunteers will glue over 600 Hemlock Pine cones on the top of the bell. The pine cones were harvested from the Pennsylvania State Tree The Hemlock Pine Tree.
- <u>Declaration of Independence and Independence Hall Float</u> While Independence Hall is the focus of America's most historic square mile, the trees that surround Independence Hall will actually be created by volunteers to flank the rear of the float. The volunteers will hand-glue hundreds of green leaves onto branches creating trees behind the Independence Hall facade and also in front of it. A printed version of the Declaration of Independence will be featured in the center of the float.

- <u>Stars Float</u> Focusing on the stars in the American Flag, volunteers will create a huge star for the rear of the float where they will glue on thousands of red cranberry seeds, white rice, and purple statice flowers to create the red, white, and blue centerpiece of his float. In addition to the centerpiece star, various stars will trim the float.
- <u>Stripes Float</u> The stripes float will focus on the stripes of the American Flag. Rather than featuring strong straight lines, the float will have abstract stripes made of pool noodles to give the stripes movement as the float travels along the route. The varied lengths of pool noodles will be wrapped in red, white, and blue ribbons capped off by metallic sprays.
- <u>Horticultural Float</u> Flowers have been an important part of life for countless years, so it makes sense to feature a horticultural float in the parade. The float will be made by volunteers and will feature faux red roses, white faux roses, and blue/purple wisteria.
- <u>Fireworks Float</u> Volunteers will create a variety of fireworks rockets where they will paint and decorate quikrete concrete form tubes. The traditional tubes used for making cement forms for posts, mailboxes, or flag poles will be cut to varying sizes and capped off with metallic tops to make it look as though the fireworks are exploding.

To enhance all floats, bubble machines and sound systems will be used to add fun and entertainment along the route.

About the Red, White, & Blue To-Do Musical Performances

Dan Blacksberg's Freilachs Music

On Blacksberg's Freilachs Music shares a modern, yet timeless klezmer sound anchored by Dan's trombone. One of the world's leading klezmer trombonists, Dan has taken the trombone from its traditional role behind the scenes as an accompaniment instrument and put it firmly in the spotlight. Freilachs Music was the term that Dan's grandmother-in-law called the music we normally know as klezmer. When Dan first played Yiddish music for her at an early meeting, she exclaimed "How did you learn to play that Freilachs Music?" This is how Dan can honor his extended family history and the yiddish history of his native Philadelphia to create a sound that is rooted in the past and is relevant to today.

• Callahan, McComiskey and Kelly

One of the most virtuosic, eclectic and innovative trios performing traditional Irish music anywhere in the U.S. and abroad. World-renowned musicians Brendan Callahan (fiddle), Sean McComiskey (accordion) and Darin Kelly (guitar) have more than 100 years' worth of collective experience performing all over the world, and their unique brand of evocative, expressive playing honors the ancient traditions of Irish music, while offering fresh perspectives of its possibilities.

• Spirit Wing

 Spirit Wing is the contemporary Native American musical group most commonly known for playing dancers' breaks at Powwows and at festivals across the region.
 The married duo of Barry Lee (guitar and vocals) and Barbara Andrews-Christy (flues and vocals) are dedicated to the traditional Native American music and storytelling of the Eastern Woodlands.

• Los Bomberos de la Calle

O Los Bomberos De La Calle is a musical group that performs traditional and contemporary styles of Bomba & Plena music from Puerto Rico as well as jamming out at local parks for the community. They have been blessed to perform and share this soulful music at many events such as the annual Hispanic heritage festival in Philly, the 2015 Mummers Day Parade, the annual feria de barrio festival, annual sugar cane festival, Kimmel center/songs left behind, The Mann center, and many more. Their mission is to give a piece of Puerto Rican culture to Philly and the surrounding areas, and to preserve, educate, and serve the community with this vibrant, energetic and soulful music from Puerto Rico. This music is the music of the people and brings everyone together young and old.

• Dolphin and LaPrelle

Elizabeth LaPrelle and Brian Dolphin are a married duo who share a love of bright vocal harmonies, eerie traditional songs, and heartfelt originals. Elizabeth is a world-renowned ballad singer and scholar from rural Virginia and Brian is a songwriter, producer, and ethnomusicologist who has studied folk music all over the world.

• Mad Beatz Philly

o Mad Beatz Philly positively influences the life and career trajectories of young drummers from Philadelphia. In this special two-hour block party outside the African American Museum in Philadelphia, Mad Beatz Philly will throw a party featuring a DJ, emcees from around the city, and a live drumline playing hip hop cadences. Since Mad Beatz Philly's founding in 2013, they have engaged more than 100 high school drummers in Kensington and West Philadelphia, of which more than 1/5 have found careers as professional musicians and teachers across Philadelphia and beyond.

• Philadelphia Suns

The Philadelphia Suns is a 30-year-old community service organization based in Philadelphia's Historic Chinatown neighborhood. The group will appear at the Arch Street Meetinghouse on July 2 to demonstrate the 1,000+ year-old Chinese Lion Dance, traditionally performed during the Chinese New Year and other special occasions.

Rubble City String Band

• The Rubble City String Band performs an entertaining mix of old-time, bluegrass, folk, country and blue music. They regularly play square dances and have a monthly residency at Abyssinia Upstairs on the fourth Thursday of every month.

• Project Capoeira

O Project Capoeira organizes the largest Brazilian culture celebration in Pennsylvania, Brazilian Day Philadelphia. The group teaches capoeira, a folk and martial art that highlights self-expression and balance in life, at 12th and Race streets.. Adenilson Dos Santos, the organization's artistic director, oversees capoeira groups in five continents, eight countries, and 11 states. His cultural work has been recognized by both the U.S. and Brazilian governments.

Red, White, & Blue To-Do Decorating Days

To prepare for this historic celebration, <u>Wagon Decorating</u> will take place at the National Constitution Center, free and open to the public. Anyone can help create one of the official wagon "floats" for the Red, White, & Blue To-Do Pomp & Parade, but space is limited and <u>advanced registration is encouraged</u>. The District will have Red, White, & Blue To-Do Decorating Days from June 29 -July 1, 2024, 10 am – 1 pm and 2 – 5 pm.

<u>Decoration Stations</u> will be available at each of the Philadelphia Historic District attractions and partner organizations for visitors to festoon themselves for the parade.

The District itself will get a <u>boost of bunting</u>, <u>balloons</u>, <u>and begonias</u> to bring a festive atmosphere throughout Independence Week.

Know the History

The official Independence Day—July 2, 1776—came to be when the Second Continental Congress voted in Independence Hall to approve a resolution declaring: "That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved."

John Adams thought July 2 should be marked as a national holiday for generations to come: "The Second Day of July 1776, will be the most memorable Epocha, in the History of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival...It ought to be solemnized with Pomp and Parade with shews, Games, Sports, Guns,

Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this continent to the other from this Time forward forever more," Adams wrote to his wife, Abigail Adams. The Declaration of Independence was signed by representatives from the Colonies two days later, on July 4, 1776.
